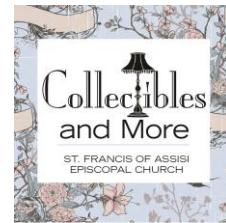

## CONFIRMATION CLASSES BEGIN ON SUNDAY, JULY 7, 2019

### WHAT IS CONFIRMATION?

The sacramental rite in which the candidates "express a mature commitment to Christ, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop" (BCP p. 860).

Father Tim and St. Francis Catechist John Griffing, will be conducting confirmation (catechism) classes each Sunday during the month of July (7, 14, 21, and 28) in the Parish library. The classes are open to youth ages 13 and over and adults of all ages.

The classes are intended for who have not been received into the Episcopal Church; for those answering the call of reaffirmation into the Church; or anyone wishing to learn more about the Episcopal Church. The 2018 class included all of the above. Classes include, but are not limited to:

- \* Church History;
- \* The Bible;
- \* The Life of Jesus; and
- \* The Book of Common Prayer, among others.

A retreat at the Church is scheduled for Saturday, September 28 from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Participants will participate in an instructional Eucharist and prepare for the Bishop's annual visit. The Bishop's 2019 parish visit is scheduled for Sunday, October 6, 2019.

## DO YOU KNOW BOB MENZER?



I, Robert Everett Menzer (Bob), was born on December 21, 1938, in Washington, D.C. At that time, my parents were living at the house my grandfather built on MacArthur Boulevard, N.W. My father had to leave high school in the 11<sup>th</sup> grade to go to work. He married my mother, Ora Taylor Oates, whom he met while she boarded at his home when she came from Arkansas to take a job with the federal government.

When I was still an infant, my family moved to southeast D.C. where I attended elementary school. We lived in a small house, but moved to an apartment when my father left for military service during World War II, serving in the U.S. Infantry in both Europe and the Philippines. When he returned home, I was in the sixth grade when we moved to a house in Hyattsville, Maryland where we lived until I graduated from high school in 1956. I won a scholarship and attended the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia, from which I received a B.S. in chemistry in 1960. During an Easter break from school, a friend took me to St. Paul's Episcopal Church in D.C. at the Easter midnight service, which was my conversion experience into the Episcopal Church. I was later confirmed at Washington Cathedral.

After graduation from Penn, I immediately enrolled in grad school at the University of Maryland and received an M.S. degree in entomology in 1962. While at the University of Maryland, I met and courted Sara Lee Gribbon, who was the assistant to the Episcopal Chaplain at the University. We were married that same year and Sara Lee joined me in Madison, Wisconsin where I had gone for doctoral studies at the University of Wisconsin. We lived there until I received my Ph.D. degree in 1964.

Upon graduation, we moved back to Maryland where I took up my post as Assistant Professor of Entomology at the University of Maryland. We purchased our Wells Parkway house in Maryland and our first child, Ronald Eric was born shortly afterward. Our two other children, Paul Daniel and Joan Coleraine, were born two years and four- and one-half years later. I rose in the academic ranks to full professor and served in several administrative posts at the University. I retired as Professor Emeritus from the University of Maryland in 1989.

In 1985 we moved to Gulf Breeze, and we bought a house at 90 Highpoint Drive in Gulf Breeze overlooking Pensacola Bay. After looking for an Episcopal Church, we found St. Francis. I became the Director of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Gulf Breeze Environmental Research Laboratory. However, Sara Lee and I moved back to Washington, D.C. in 1995 when I was appointed senior science advisor in the EPA's National Center for Environmental Research. In 2001, I retired from government service, and Sara Lee and I returned to Gulf Breeze where we now happily reside and attend St. Francis Church.

## ST. FRANCIS DAY BLESSING OF THE ANIMALS, FAMILY FESTIVAL & BAZAAR

St. Francis Day is still several months in the future (Saturday, October 5) but, in Gulf Breeze/Pensacola, you must begin early if you plan to hold any type of festival in the fall of the year. The competition is fierce. That competition explains why St. Francis' ECW began work on our family festival last March. The early bird gets the pony rides, clowns, balloon twisters and musical acts which create the type of event local families and their children want to attend. It's a plan that's working too!

We want to be sure that kids of all ages have a good time. The Iron Horse Stables (pony rides); Giggles the Clown (face painting & balloon twisting); the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's K-9 Corps; the Gulf Breeze Police K-9 Unit; and, Mary Owen & the Service Dog University are confirmed parts of our program.

We will have a stage featuring live jazz, blues and rock music acts and educational demonstrations beginning after the traditional Blessing of the Animals (10 a.m.) and continuing into the afternoon.

By noon the stomachs will be growling and that will signal the start of our Old-Fashioned Fish Fry and Bar-B-Que. The cost is \$8 per adult and kids (10 & under) eat FREE. There will be plenty of hot dogs and hamburgers for those who do not eat fish. Sodas and popcorn will be available all day.

For the first time, St Francis Day will feature an exposition of the arts & crafts of some of the most talented artists in our area. We have already rented one third of the 34 exhibit spaces in this, our first exposition. Exhibits will be positioned inside and outside throughout the church property. Andrews Institute has already agreed to allow St. Francis Day attendees to park at their facility.

Attention to our furry friends does not end with the 10 a.m. Blessing of the Animals. Dr. Walter Gandy from Coastal Sunrise Animal Hospital will be present to examine our pets and provide affordable inoculations if needed. The Friends of Escambia County Animal Shelter will also bring some of their candidates for adoption.

There will be continual updates on St. Francis Day activities in the monthly Messenger and whenever warranted in our Sunday Bulletins. Be sure to circle Saturday, October 5 on your calendar now.

## JOHN APPELYARD TO END PARISH SUPPER SEASON JUNE 26

Recently, he has appeared as the color commentator for BLAB-TV broadcasts of Pensacola Blue Wahoo baseball games. John's topic for our Parish Supper will be the "Arrival of Protestant Churches in Pensacola."

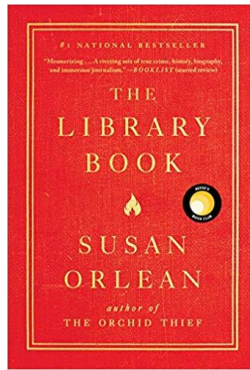
